Dear families,

Welcome to the final week of Semester One. This term has flown by and we are all deserving of a well earned rest before we begin Term 3. We wish all families a safe and enjoyable break no matter if you are having a trip interstate or making the most of what Canberra has to offer.

Tomorrow, Tuesday 2 July Natalie is hosting a Principal's Morning Tea where selected students from across all classes have received an invitation for this prestigious event. The students who have been selected have demonstrated their very best in upholding the school PBL values of being a safe, respectful, responsible, learner. Well done to all selected students and I hope you have a wonderful morning tea with your peers.

With NAIDOC week just around the corner one of our fabulous teachers, Tash Lillywhite, has put the following together to help us understand and commemorate this important week of the year.

Yaama Latham community,

NAIDOC week is right around the corner, during the first week of school holidays, the 7th of July-14th of July. What exactly is NAIDOC Week? Why do we have it? I am so glad you asked, it started on the 26th of January 1938, a group of over 1000 Aboriginal people gathered at Australia Hall

in Sydney to call for full citizenship statuses and laws to improve the lives of First Nations people. As one of the first major civil rights gatherings in the world, this day became known as the Day of Mourning. Since then, National NAIDOC Week has grown to become both a commemoration of the first Day of Mourning as well as a celebration of the history, culture, and excellence of First Nations people. From 1940 until 1955, the Day of Mourning was held annually on the Sunday before the 26th of Jan and was known as 'Aboriginies Day'. In 1955 it was shifted to the first Sunday in July when it was decided that the day should also become a celebration of Aboriginal culture as well as a day of protest. In 1974, for the first time, the NAIDOC committee was composed entirely of Aboriginal representatives.

The following year, it was decided that NAIDOC be expanded to become a week of celebrations, from the first to the second Sunday in July.

This year's theme is 'KEEP THE FIRE BURNING! BLAK, LOUD AND PROUD'. The theme honours the enduring strength and vitality of First Nations culture – with fire, a symbol of connection to Country, to each other, and to the rich tapestry of traditions that define Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. Held across the country from 7-14 July, NAIDOC Week will celebrate and recognise the history, culture, and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. It is recommended that families celebrate our First Nations Culture by participating in the Aboriginal Plant Use Walks at the Australian National Botanic Gardens on Wednesday the 10th of July. You can also go to the National Art Gallery or the National Museum and look at the First Nations histories and cultures on display.

ICAS and Australian Maths Competition (AMC) competitions

This year we are proud to reintroduce both ICAS and AMC competitions for our students. ICAS and AMT are online academic competitions that gives students the opportunity to challenge their higher order thinking and problem-solving skills in English, Mathematics (AMT only), Science, and Digital Technologies.

ICAS and AMC results are in-depth and meaningful, and both competitions evaluate student performance against other competition entrants across the state and nation. The data reveals student strengths and weaknesses and can help you recognise and support your child's academic journey.

On a personal note, I am one of 10 academics and teachers from all over Australia who meet each year to write questions for the AMC. I am one of only two original members of this committee and have been writing questions since 2002, when the AMC opened up to students in years 3-6. It is very exciting for me to see the AMC becoming a part of our competition cycle.

A form to register to ICAS competitions is attached in this newsletter and the AMC permission notes will be sent out later this week. ICAS is open to students in year 2+ and AMC for students in year 3+.

Finally, we recommend students arriving as close to 9:00 am as possible each morning. Student supervision begins at 8:40 and we strongly encourage families to not have students on-site before this time.

We are already at the end of semester 1 after two busy terms of Japanese learning. Students from Kindergarten to Year 6 have been learning a variety of different words, phrases and language structures through various topics and themes.

Kindergarten students have learnt a number of greetings and can now introduce themselves in Japanese.

Year 1 and 2 students have focussed on language they can use in the classroom. They can identify classroom objects and ask to borrow something.

Year 3 and 4 have learnt language about the body and can give a description of others using a range of adjectives they have learned.

Year 5 and 6 have studied Japan as a country. They have become familiar with the cities, islands and geography of Japan. The focus was to learn the famous landmarks and tourist attractions, and describe in Japanese what a city or place is famous for.

Students in all years have impressed me with their effort and willingness to attempt new language patterns. Practising new words and sentences is essential when learning a language and it's wonderful to see students doing so. Sometimes I hear this practise when I am on playground duty and students approach me with the words and phrases we have been learning in class. This always makes me smile and fills my bucket. Keep it up!

All classes this term began their Japanese lessons learning about 'Kodomo no hi' or Children's Day. Kodomo no hi is a Japanese festival which takes place on the 5th May each year. On this day families celebrate the healthy growth and happiness of children. On Children's Day, families with boys fly huge carp streamers (koinobori) outside the house and display dolls of famous samurai warriors inside. The carp was chosen because if symbolises strength and success. In our Japanese classes we made a variety of paper carp streamers and origami helmets. Students enjoyed these activities and it was a fun way to acknowledge the festival.

I would like to thank all students for their hard work in Japanese this semester and I look forward to working with you all again next term.



























ROSTRUM QUARTER FINAL 2024

Introducing Strong Foundations

The ACT Government announced a \$24.9 million investment over the next four years to improve literacy and numeracy outcomes for students in ACT public schools.

This means a new suite of system-wide initiatives, called *Strong Foundations*, that will support all students at ACT public schools to have access to consistent, high-quality literacy and numeracy education.

Under Strong Foundations, your family will have access to:

- evidence-informed and consistent teaching practices in every classroom
- common assessments, including a year 1 phonics test
- advice and resources for parents, to support their children with literacy and numeracy, and
- multi-tiered systems of support for students in every public school

From the start of 2025, our Kindergarten to Year 2 classes will receive additional funding to purchase new literacy and numeracy teaching materials and equipment, including decodable readers and mathematical resources.

The Education Directorate is currently planning supports for every ACT public school to adopt a more consistent approach to literacy and numeracy education.


